

The Imam and the Pastor

Pastor James' left arm ends in a stump that protrudes from his sleeve. He lost his hand a number of years ago. It happened while he was leading his young Christian militia against their mortal enemies, young Muslim men, who were also organized into paramilitary units led by Imam Ashaffa.

This religious strife raged in Kaduna, a city in Nigeria about 110 miles north of Kwoi, where the Gweimen Centre is located. Kaduna's population is evenly divided between Muslims and Christians. It is so divided, in fact, that they even live on opposite sides of the river from each other.

Throughout the 1990's both sides taught thousands of young men to kill in defense of their faith. Those who died were considered to be martyrs. To justify his "Christian" war on Muslims Pastor James had argued: "we have no other cheek to turn." It was in one of their losing battles that the victors chopped off his hand with a machete. As for Imam Ashaffa, he was bitter because two of his close relatives were killed.

But the real story only begins there. In a remarkable turn of events one day Imam Ashaffa reached out to Pastor James to put an end to the carnage. Only when these tentative overtures found a hesitant response did the two "blood enemies" begin a dialogue that has led to an "astonishing reconciliation."

They began to work together slowly rebuilding peace in Kaduna, each from a renewed understanding of his own faith, and an emerging respect for each

other. A major focus of their mediation efforts was to retrain their young militia members to become civic peace activists.

Two of their concrete achievements as peacemakers further promote the impact of this unlikely partnership:

1) They have established the Interfaith Mediation Centre which is introduced with a sign on the door of their office that reads "Peace Hall."

2) Their mission has since been celebrated in a film called "The Imam and the Pastor."

We like to believe with thanks to God that in a country torn by religious war we are seeing at least one small sign of an answer to the brief but eloquent prayer: "Give us peace in our time."
